Have a look at this beautiful Willow pattern teapot. It is the last remaining piece of a *Spode* tea set that was used in the grand Thomastown House near Athlone.

The blue willow pattern was first used to decorate porcelain at the end of 18th Century and has been very popular ever since.


The Blue Willow pattern represents the Chinese story of Koong-see, the beautiful daughter of a wealthy merchant and her father's clerk- Chang.


